SECTION 1: THE DOMESTIC CHURCH



The domestic church is the foundation and source for all marriage preparation and beyond. The home is where husband and wife live the bond of marriage and where parents teach their children to know, love, and serve God. Christian parents, by virtue of their Baptism, are called to bear witness to their faith, especially within the home.

Sharing in Christ's own mission, the family through Baptism is "priest, prophet and king"; priest, through the offering of sacrificial love and adoration of God; prophet through the witness to supernatural reality of God's Kingdom; and king, through the order and harmony that the family fosters within the home, community, and Church.

Pastoral approaches to foster and sustain in families the call to form a domestic church:

- Preaching and parish events on appropriate feast days that highlight marriage and family life:
 - January 1: Mary, the Holy Mother of God (Holy Day of Obligation)
 - 1st Sunday after January 1: The Epiphany of the Lord
 - February 2: The Presentation of the Lord
 - March 19: St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary

- July 26: Saints Joachim and Anne, Parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary
 - November 21: The Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary
 - December 6: Saint Nicholas
- Seasonal large group baptism celebrations at the parish.
 - Offer to visit parish families with a blessing of the home.
 - Offer babysitting for parish events intended for adults.
 - Small group family seminars and rosary groups, bible discussion, and gatherings of couples for mutual support and enrichment.
 - Offering a Mass for Grandparents on the National Day for Grandparents and the Elderly.
 - Retreats for spouses and/or families with opportunities for confession and spiritual direction; may include an opportunity for a family consecration (e.g., Sacred Heart of Jesus, St. Joseph, Holy Family).
 - Offer opportunities to serve the parish as families; greeters, serving at parish events, supporting ministry to the homebound, writing cards for nursing homes or the military.

SECTION 2: MARRIAGE ENRICHMENT

The Church is obliged to always assist couples, but they should be especially assisted during times of transition and change throughout their marriage. Christian couples should be reminded to draw upon the grace of the Sacrament of Matrimony in times of joy and need.

The first few years of marriage are especially critical to the life of a married couple. It is important to remind newly married couples that the wedding is just the beginning of a journey marked by joys and challenges. Newly married couples should be invited to engage in parish life and to meet other couples for support and faith sharing. Mentorship and accompaniment are essential to help families build strong relationships through all stages of life.



Pastoral approaches to support Marriage Enrichment:

- Acknowledge wedding anniversaries once a month.

Pastoral approaches to support parenting:

- Host events on parenting through programs at the parish with local and national speakers.
- Host events on ways to create a more Catholic home, including family dinners and prayer.
- Offer practical skills on managing stress, time management, growing in faith together, and caregiving.

SECTION 3: MARRIAGE PREPARATION

Marriage preparation should provide engaged couples with the help needed to receive and live out the sacrament, involving the entire parish community. In recent years, the Vatican Dicastery for the Laity, the Family and Life has called for the Church to adopt a [catechumenate approach to marriage](#). This journey, which begins in the domestic church, should include the following skills when formal marriage preparation begins, typically 6-12 months prior to the wedding:

- Practical life skills, sound advice, proven strategies, and psychological guidance.
- Outreach to engaged couples to connect to the local parish community and be supported by a mentor or sponsor couple.



- Opportunities of prayer with and for engaged couples, such as the Blessing of the Engaged Couple or Rite of Betrothal, adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, the Sacrament of Penance, etc.
- An opportunity for the evangelization or re-evangelization of the couple and a summons to a life of faith and holiness.
- Pastoral strategies to provide ongoing training and formation for pastoral leaders who assist with the preparation of couples for marriage, including clergy, seminarians, mentor couples, parish staff, and volunteers.
- Married couples in the parish should be adequately trained to serve as witnesses and mentors for engaged couples, with attention to the cultural needs of the couple.
- Topics and content:
 - The seriousness of marriage as a covenant of the whole of life, ordered to the good of the spouses and the procreation and education of children The nature of marriage as instituted by God.
 - The vocation of marriage and its responsibilities.
 - How to pray together as a couple.
 - The role of Christian spouses as witnesses to the charity that flows from Christ.
 - Living conjugal chastity as a virtue with admonition to cohabiting couples.
 - The responsibility of Catholic parents to have their children baptized and raised in the Catholic faith and to build the domestic church as ministers of their home.
 - Natural Family Planning as a tool for respecting and living God’s design for married love while discerning God’s will for the size of their family.
 - Moral teaching of the Church on reproductive technologies and ethical solutions to infertility.
 - Sensitive issues such as pornography use and addiction, resolving abortion trauma, sexual and domestic abuse and violence, the experience of separation and divorce in one’s family of origin.
 - Practical skills such as communication, financial planning, extended family dynamics, etc.

Establishing a Marriage Preparation Program for your parish:

- Recruit and appoint a Marriage/Wedding Coordinator for your parish. This can be a paid staff member, volunteer, or member of the clergy.
- Identify and recruit mentor couples to accompany the engaged couple through the wedding and the first 5 years.
- Establish the requirements and timeline that newly engaged couples must complete prior to their wedding date.
- Offer on-going formation of the coordinator and mentor couples.

The Marriage Preparation Process and Requirements:

- Schedule an initial meeting with the couple and welcome and affirm their decision to marry in the Church and begin the prenuptial investigation form:
 - One or both partners should be baptized Catholics.
 - Free to marry.
 - Both members of the couple should be unmarried. If either were previously married, they must be widowed or issued an annulment from the Catholic Church.
 - It is the Church’s teaching that marriage is between a man and a woman.
 - Free consent.
 - Both parties must freely consent to the marriage and have worked out any issues that might cause one party not to freely consent.

- Determine a marriage inventory or assessment to administer to engaged couples.
 - This tool will highlight the strengths and growth areas in your relationship, and help you discover and discuss these as a couple.

- Establish a parish-based marriage prep retreat or provide alternatives:
 - Robust marriage preparation programs include the formation topics above.
 - Recommended programs and resources for your parish retreats:
 - Witness to Love (<https://witnessstolove.org/>) is a virtues-based, Catechumenate model of marriage renewal and preparation. Integrates modern principles of psychology and the virtues to help couples facilitate an authentic dialogue about their relationship. What makes Witness to Love unique is that the engaged couple chooses their own mentor couple. This is a couple they both admire and see as a source of faith formation. This mentor couple gives them a concrete connection and integration into the parish.

- Determine an introduction to Natural Family Planning - can be through inventory/assessment, retreat, or outside resource. Diocesan recommended resources: <https://catechesis.diojoliet.org/marriage-and-family-resources>
- Establish parish specific requirements on liturgy, music, timelines, etc.
- Establish a continued accompaniment plan for couples after the wedding for the first year and 5 years of marriage to build relationships and community within the parish.

Convalidation Information for Couples

Catholic Church law ordinarily requires baptized Roman Catholics to marry before a priest or deacon unless a couple received a “dispensation from canonical form,” Catholics who exchange vows in the presence of ministers from other religious traditions or civil officials are not considered validly married in the eyes of the Catholic Church. Evangelizing these civilly married couples is a wonderful way to welcome them and marry in the Church.

Establishing a convalidation program at your parish:

- Create an awareness and communication plan for reaching out to civilly married couples in your parish.
 - Actively communicate in the parish, bulletin, emails blats, and flyers the option for convalidation
- Create formation opportunities for these couples to be married in the Catholic Church.
 - Timeline and frequency of convalidation group celebrations, such as quarterly or yearly

- Determine the marriage preparation activities that are required – inventory assessment, retreat, practical skills, and NFP for example, using the typical marriage preparation process as a template.

SECTION 4: GRANDPARENTS AND THE ELDERLY

It is important that the Church recognizes the value of the elderly members of our community. They bring unique gifts, talents, and wisdom, and provide us with opportunities to serve them, as they have, and continue to serve us. We must consider all ageing members of the community, not just grandparents, and welcome them to celebrations and events, while also at times specifically inviting them to opportunities just for them.

Pastoral approaches to accompany grandparents and the elderly:

- Create opportunities to recognize and honor the elderly and/or grandparents by planning intergenerational gatherings where young and old can encounter one another in meaningful ways.

- Create activities that involve the elderly and/or grandparents at Catholic schools and religious education/faith formation programs as a way for them to share their knowledge and love of the faith.
- Outreach to the elderly in assisted living facilities and senior care centers, ensuring that they have regular access to the sacraments and are visited and cared for by members of the parish community.
- Training opportunities for Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion and other volunteers to provide for the various physical, material, and spiritual needs of the elderly.

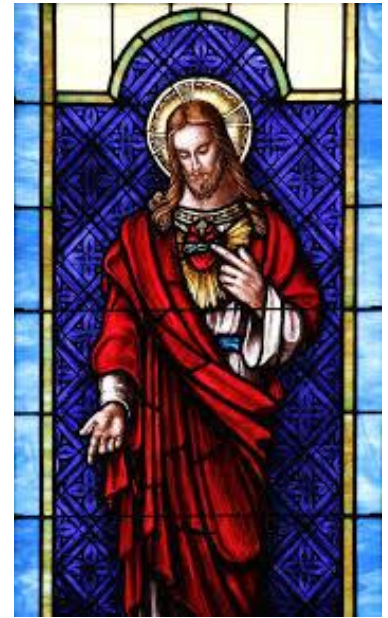


SECTION 5: FAMILIES IN NEED OF PASTORAL CARE

During every marriage, and over the course of family life, times will arise of suffering, fatigue, and misunderstandings that can cause a crisis. These are part of every family at one time or another. However, to prevent a crisis from worsening, the parish should offer pastoral service to accompany these couples and families. The parish should be aware of the needs of its people and never turn anyone away searching for care. The diocese can be a resource if the parish is not able to support these needs. Here are typical areas where couples and families may need care.
